SECTION I

(Comprehension and Contexts)

- I. Read the passage given below and answer the questions that follow :

The blackbuck is a species of antelope, native to the Indian subcontinent, which is *near threatened*, as its numbers have declined sharply over several decades. Blackbucks are slender with a head-to-body length of about 120 cm. They are about 73.7 to 83.8 cm high at the shoulder. Males are larger than females. Adult males range in weight from 34 to 45 kg; females weigh 31 to 39 kg. Horns are approximately 71 cm in length. Their tail is short and legs long. Both sexes are white on the belly, around the eyes and on the inside of the legs. They differ in the coloration of the head and back. Their life span recorded is approximately 12 to 16 years.

Large herds once roamed freely on the plains of north India, where they thrived best. They are found all over India, from the base of the Himalayas in the north to Kanyakumari in the south and from Punjab in the west to Assam in the east. They generally move together in big herds ranging from 5 to 50 animals with one dominant male. They run very fast, sometimes at the speed of more than 80 km/hour. They are primarily grazers and avoid thickly forested areas. They require water everyday and may move long distances in search of water. Their diet consists mainly of grass, but they occasionally eat leaves of acacia trees in deserts as well.

The blackbuck is the most widely hunted wild animal all over India and this has been the chief cause of their declining numbers.

Although Indian law strictly prohibits the hunting of these endangered animals, occasional incidents of poaching still occur.

The natural habitat of the blackbuck is also being encroached upon by man's need for arable land and grazing ground for domesticated cattle. Today, only small herds are seen, largely inside the reserves. It has now been listed as a protected animal under the Wildlife Protection Act of 1972.

The main threats to these species come from poaching, predation, habitat destruction, overgrazing, diseases and sanctuary visitors. They are hunted down chiefly by cheetahs, wolves, jackals and wild dogs.

Blackbucks are protected in various wildlife sanctuaries. Some of them are Abohar Wildlife Sanctuary, Punjab, Kanha National

Park, Madhya Pradesh, Jayamangali Blackbuck Reserve, Karnataka, Mahavir Harina Vanasthali National Park, Andhra Pradesh, Rehakuri Sanctuary, Maharashtra, Vallanad Blackbuck Sanctuary, Tamil Nadu.
