(b) How does Brecht combine aesthetics and politics in his notion of "alienation"?

Give a brief account of Gramsci's distinction between "traditional intellectuals" and "organic intellectuals".

(c) "Goods can only enter into relations under the surveillance of their guardians. It would be out of the question for them to go to the market alone." Discuss. Or

"I am also uncomfortable with the notion of a 'female imagination'." Showalter's discomfort springs from the fact that such notions are "dangerously close to reiterating 3×15=45 the familiar stereotypes." Discuss.

(a) "It is significant that 'English' as an academic subject

(b) Briefly discuss any two aspects of Eagleton's account of post-structuralism.

Discuss Eagleton's views on postcolonial theory.

"Freeplay is always an interplay of absence and presence, but if it is to be radically conceived, freeplay must be conceived of before the alternative of presence and absence; being must be conceived of as presence or absence beginning with the possibility of freeplay and not the other way around. If Levi-Strauss, better than any other, has brought to light the freeplay of repetition and the repetition of freeplay, one no less perceives

in his work a sort of ethic presence, an ethic of nostalgia for

origins, an ethic of archaic and natural innocence, of a purity of presence and self-presence in speech-an ethic, nostalgia, and even remorse which he often presents as the motivation of the ethnological project when he moves toward archaic societies—exemplary societies in his eyes."
