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- (ii) Gulliver's Travels is an amalgamation of a wide range of genres: travelogue, parody, philosophical treatise, fantasy, adventure, allegory, science fiction. What, in terms of literary form, holds the work together despite such generic diversity, and in what way does Swift employ this diversity in the service of his satirical objectives.
- 4. (i) Critically analyse Blake's "London" as "a document and a trenchant critique of the threefold process of human alienation: alienation from self, from nature, and from the human community."
